
Signs of Aging

The eyes are the focal point of facial attractiveness. Even if we take care of ourselves over time, factors such as sleep, heredity, exposure to the sun, use of alcohol, tobacco, and poor nutrition can accelerate the signs of aging around the eye. Additionally over time, the eyes can stretch and wrinkle. Fatty deposits can cause the upper eyelids to sag while the tissue can bulge forward, become discolored, or block vision. Fortunately, through modern advances in an eyelid rejuvenation procedure called a blepharoplasty, doctors at Carolina Eye can restore a more youthful, alert and healthy look on both the upper and lower eyelids. The procedure is often referred to as a "mini-face lift" due to its high level of patient satisfaction.

Before Blepharoplasty

Generally, insurance does not cover cosmetic surgery; however the procedure may be 'medically necessary' if eyelids encroach upon the field of vision. Doctors at Carolina Eye will evaluate vision, tear production, use of contact lenses, medications and discuss expectations, outcomes and risks. The information, along with other factors such as age, skin type, and ethnic background, will help determine a plan for the procedure.



Blepharoplasty Procedure

Blepharoplasty is generally done using local anesthetic. On the upper eyelids, our surgeons will remove excess skin and muscle and fatty tissue in the inside corner of the eye next to the nose. On the lower eyelids, provided there is not too much excess skin, we will make the incision inside or behind the eye lid, which allows the removal of fatty deposits while avoiding the need for an external incision. If there is excessive skin or muscle folds below the eye, an incision may also be made just below the base of the eyelashes. All incisions are made so they become barely visible over time.

After Care

After the procedure, plan to have someone drive you home. Bruising and swelling is common and noticeable for about a month. Cold compresses and head elevation will help reduce swelling and bruising and minimize discomfort. Eye ointments and eye drops may be given to keep the eye moist and clean. Post-operative discomfort varies from patient to patient requiring little, if any, pain medication.

Eyes may feel sticky, dry, and itchy for a week or more. Cleaning is essential around the eyes for the first week or two. Restricted activities apply. Some stitches dissolve while others are removed within 10-14 days. Makeup can usually be applied to camouflage bruising after stitches are removed and a pair of sunglasses may increase comfort in public. It is important to follow all post-operative instructions to speed the healing and reduce complications.

The Results

Most patients experience a noticeable improvement in the appearance of their eyes. In addition to improving some patient's vision, most report feeling more alert and energetic. Although the effects of a blepharoplasty on your appearance will be immediate, results are not final for up to a year.

If you want to look as good as you feel, ask your doctor if you are a candidate for blepharoplasty.
